

Thank you all for being here. I think I can speak for all current and former board members when I say that everything we do is for our members, and we appreciate your support.




I was a member of a team that was the first in the country to provide open captioning for its county government meetings. For those that do not know, open captioning means when you turn on that television station, you see the



The members of my team and I received letter after letter from court reporting firms who were upset the captioning contract didn't go out for bid. They thought that they could handle this project and should have been given the opportunity to give it a try. After we started, however, they slowly backed away when they saw how tough the job was.

During that time, the county offered us a chance to get benefits and a raise to a living wage, which we didn't have at that time. Because there was nobody in the country doing this type of work yet, we were paid at the civil service rate that a secretary would make...\$7 an hour. So, the raise would almost double our salary, which we still thought was great at that time, but there was a catch...we had to pass the RPR to get that bump. We had to show some sort of national or state certification.

I had taken the RPR when I was in school but didn't pass. I don't know what possessed albeit, I passed all the skills in one shot and me to try, but I did. I am the world's worst kept drowning on the written. test taker. I get caught up in my head or I forget to breathe, or I just doubt myself. It took me three tries to pass the RPR back when you had to pass all the legs at the same time to get it in the first place.

What is the FPR-C?

The FPR-C is the skills complement to FCRA's FPR and is a voluntary (optional) skills examination. In order to be eligible to sit for the FPR-C, a candidate must:

Be a current member of FCRA*;

Be a steno or voice writer;

Provide his or her own laptop and CAT software for testing; Have the ability to email his or her test papers to the Committee for grading.

*A candidate may take the FPR-C before taking the FPR, but may not use the initials "FPR-C" until the candidate successfully passes the FPR modules and test. A candidate who wishes to take the modules and examination for the FPR certification must be a participating member of FCRA.





Are you an FPR or FPR-C?

Is Your Cycle Ending on 12/31/23 or 3/31/24?

Here are a few important things to remember regarding your FPR cycle:

Please remember that NCRA does not report your CEUs to FCRA or other state associations. You must submit any CEUs to FCRA to be applied to your transcript, other than the FCRA Annual Convention and the FPR course/exam and refresher. We apply those automatically.

NCRA Carryover CEUs do not apply to your FPR transcript, just as your FPR Carryover CEUs do not apply to your NCRA transcript.

If you have any CEUs to be applied, you may send certificates of completion for individual courses or send your NCRA transcript to fprquestions@fcraonline.org.

If you have CEUs that are not NCRA approved, and they fall under the categories of approved topics, we will need this FCRA CEU request form (PDF) submitted along with those CEU certificates.

Your FCRA membership must stay current in order to maintain and use the FPR or FPR-C designation.

Remember to occasionally check the status of your FPR cycle so you know when your cycle ends and what CEUs you need to complete your cycle.

To check the status of your current FPR cycle, you will log into CE Tracker Live by using this link: http://www.cetrackerlive.com/app/. This information can also be found on our website under FPR, View and Print Current Transcript. Account Name for all users on CE Tracker is FCRA FPR.


"Know your worth, then add tax."

A group I'm in asked people to post things they wish they knew before becoming a working court reporter. I realized that all but (maybe) one could be applied to any industry/field and just to life in general. I know I'm constantly preaching 2, 3, 4, and 7 to my kids. The fourth one is the one that chagrins me the most when they use it against me.

- Get/find a mentor ASAP. Learn from someone who is successfully doing what you want to do. Your state association is a great place to start.
- What's for you is for you. Just cuz it's always been done a certain way, doesn't mean it's the only way. There's nothing wrong with going out and blazing a trail even from day one/as a new reporter.
- As trite and cliche as it sounds, it's true: Know your worth, then add tax.
- Don't be afraid to ask for everything you want. The worst thing you can be told is "no," which leaves you no worse off than before you asked.
- Don't get in the habit of working nights and weekends unless you're being paid extra (expedited rates) to do so (or because you actually want to).
- Take time off and away!
- Others' experiences don't have to be your own. You can learn from their mistakes.
- If you choose to freelance, production isn't scary and having your own clients doesn't need to be either.

The Arlene P.
